
Double Trouble in Bugland



This collection of five detective stories follows Inspector Mantis, of brilliant mind and supersensitive antennae, and his faithful sidekick Doctor Hopper, an accomplished violinist and long-jumper, as they solve entomological cases with clever sleuthing. Criminal detection, combined with entomology, makes this, in the words of *The Horn Book*, "the most engaging and cleverest reincarnation of Sherlock Holmes and Doctor Watson yet." Servello's color and pen-&-ink drawings bring exquisite period detail to these tales: steam engines,

deerstalkers, and mandibles have never been more lovingly crosshatched.

Known for experimenting across genres, WILLIAM KOTZWINKLE is the author of over 20 novels and 15 children's books, including the novelization of *E.T.* Kotzwinkle won the National Magazine Award for Fiction in 1972 and 1975, the World Fantasy Award in 1977 for *Doctor Rat*, and the O. Henry Prize in 1977.

Joe Servello is best known as an illustrator of children's books. He has also designed covers for detective novels for a number of authors, including Frederic Brown and Leigh Brackett. He currently lives in Altoona, PA and often produces historical artwork of the town.





A BIOGRAPHY OF HENRY BESTON by Daniel G. Payne

When war broke out in Europe in 1914, a twenty-six-year-old Harvard writing instructor named Henry Sheahan volunteered with the American Field Service in France. After serving as an ambulance driver on the western front, Sheahan, now writing under the pen name Henry Beston, began publishing children's stories. Then, in September of 1926, Beston spent a two-week vacation—which stretched into a full year—in a Cape Cod shack he'd built high on an isolated stretch of dunes overlooking the Atlantic Ocean. The resulting book, The Outermost House, is universally considered a classic of American nature writing. In later books, Beston explored the ways that the modern industrial era was endangering the vital connection between humankind and the natural world, and he is now recognized not only as an avatar of the conserva-

tion movement, but also among the early proponets of "nature writing" whose company included Muir and Burroughs. In this first biography, scholar Daniel G. Payne—granted unrestricted access to the writer's archives and drawing on interviews with friends and family—has crafted a scrupulously researched narrative, one presenting a masterful portrait that traces the intellectual growth and tumultuous life of a vital American writer whose work and thought have exerted a tremendous pull on poets, naturalists, and novelists alike.





The Parable of the Blind

"A knocking on the barn door drags us out of our sleep. No, the knocking isn't inside us, it's outside, where the other people are." With that, six blind beggars in 16th century Flanders—a ragged, profane, and irascible crew—find themselves waking to yet another grim day in the dark. Today, however, something is different. Today these men have an appointment with a painter: they have been hired as models, to pose for Pieter Bruegel's grotesque masterpiece-in-the-making, The Parable of the Blind. With startling verbal ingenuity and black humor worthy of Beckett or José Saramago, Gert Hofmann's novel follows this tattered sextet's shambling progress across a Renaissance landscape peopled by halfheard voices and unseen dangers, towards their ultimate encounter with the great, capricious artist, and (perhaps) their own immortality. 

GERT HOFMANN (1931-1993) was a prolific German writer of both novels and radio-plays. In the 1980s, he won prizes such as the Prix Italia and the Doblin prize. He is most well known for examining mortality and the resonances of Nazism in postwar Germany. His 1985 novel, Der Blindensturz was translated into English by Christopher Middleton in 1989, and retitled The Parable of the Blind.

CHRISTOPHER MIDDLETON (1926-2015) was a British poet, professor, and translator. He specialized in Germanic Languages & Literature, and was a professor at the University of Texas from 1966 to 1998. He has translated works from many German authors, including Nietzsche, Hölderlin, and Hofmann, and has been awarded the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize, as well as the Schlegel-Tieck prize for translation.


Yankee Doodle Alphabet



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

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The Door in the Wall

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

"Our business," author Wells wrote to photographer Coburn, "is to see what we can and render it." This marvel, first printed in 1911 as a limited edition by Frederic Goudy, presents the unprecedented collaboration between writer and artist, where both forms rise into a single work of art.

The eight stories here show Wells in various moods and foreshadow his celebrity. These are uncanny tales, resonating strangely, despite arising from ordinary thoughts, interactions, and memories. Wells shows just how fantastic the everyday can be, if one only pauses to reflect on missed chances, suggestions of what might have been, bleak premonitions of blessed futures whose utopian promise is destroyed by new forms of war.

Bestiary or, the parade of orpheus by Guillaume Apollinaire


An early and influential champion of cubism, the friend of Braque, Picasso, Dufy, Rousseau, and Marie Laurencin (who became his mistress), Apollinaire was a seminal figure in the revolutionary art style known as "Surrealism," a term that he coined some seven years before Breton formally founded the movement. In this charming book, published in 1910 and embellished with the graphically sophisticated and totally appropriate woodcuts of Dufy, we find the poet at his most accessible. His quatrains, printed in Dante italic and felicitously translated by Pepe Karmel, present a voice that ranges from the colloquial to the impassioned, a brisk combination of lyric imagery and bawdy humor (not surprising for a poet who, after a pious adolescence, supported himself by writing pornogra-

phy). This small format reissue of a celebrated *livre de peintre* is a small bijou of a book, a lovely and lively ensemble of accessible poetry and striking woodcut art.

ONE MAN'S OBSESSION WITH BOOK COLLECTING: AN EPISTOLARY NOVEL by N. John Hall

"Let the buyer beware." Flush with \$400,000 from the sale of his great-great-grandfather's correspondence with Victorian authors, Larry Dickerson, our unassuming retired bank clerk, amateur editor, and literary neophyte, needs a creative outlet for his newly acquired wealth and fast escalating obsession with all things bookish. His journey begins with collecting rare editions of Victorian novelists but soon spirals rapidly into the abyss of *New Yorker* authors, his determination to acquire growing with each new purchase. James Thurber, E. B. White, Vladimir Nabokov, J. D. Salinger, and Dorothy Parker all find their way onto Larry's shortlist, standing alongside previously acquired Victorian greats Trollope, Dickens, Thackeray, and Hardy. Being sensible, he approaches



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the biggest names in the rare book field with childish glee, and refreshing brashness, finds himself in the *New Yorker* offices, handling copies of authors' most coveted titles, and then involved in the biggest scandal book collecting has ever seen. Will the thrill of the chase overwhelm Larry's ability to see reason? Will his appetite outpace his resources? Join him on this journey as he discovers just how far he's willing to take his obsession.

AN ADVENTURE IN LETTERS by N. John Hall

Part suspense novel, part literary *tour de force*, this is a book for lovers of Victorian literature, but also a bracing antidote for those less enthusiastic readers who may have found Dickens too melodramatic, Thackeray too allusive, and Hardy too pessimistic. The story begins when Larry Dickerson inherits a parcel of letters addressed to his great-great-grandfather who corresponded with leading contemporary writers. In his quest to auction them off for as much money as possible, Larry develops his own correspondence and his own obsession, and gradually he is seduced by the Victorian mind.







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
Honeymoon · translated by Barbara Wright
